# SAMS

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## ACHIEVEMENTS

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### Ar-Raqqa

- Shipment of medicines and medical consumables donated to the National Hospital and the Pediatric Hospital.
- Meeting held with the Ar-Raqqa Directorate of Health on 26 January to assess needs and gaps.
- Karmazah Health Center: Provision of primary health care services and outpatient consultations.
- Agreement reached to expand the Intensive Care Unit at the National Hospital from 12 to 24 beds, with delivery and installation planned for next week.
- SAMS to support laboratory services through device rehabilitation and restoration, strengthen the emergency unit, and equip the ICU with the required beds.
- Provision of laboratory consumables for both the National Hospital and the Children's Hospital in Ar-Raqqa.

### Al-Hasakah

- Ongoing primary health care services at Al-Qahtaniya PHC supported by SAMS.
- Makhatele Health Center: Fully operational, providing general medicine, dental care, sexual and reproductive health services, leishmaniasis treatment, cholera management through ORPs, nutrition services, psychosocial support (PSS), and laboratory services.
- Additional support includes two Mobile Medical Units in Ras Al-Ain and Tel Abiad, four ambulances (two in Ras Al-Ain and two in Tel Abiad), and PSS services at Ali Bajliyah PHC.

### Deir Ez-Zor Governorate

- Medical mission deployed to provide essential health care to the local population.
- Expansion of mission coverage to include the following locations: Al-Kharyta, Maternity Hospital, Al-Madina Hospital, and Al-Mayadeen.
- Ongoing support to Al-Mayadeen Hospital, Maternity and Children Hospital, Al-Madina Hospital, and Albukamal PHC.
- Delivery of training sessions and medical lectures for physicians, focusing on capacity building and strengthening clinical competencies.
- Continuation of oncology services.

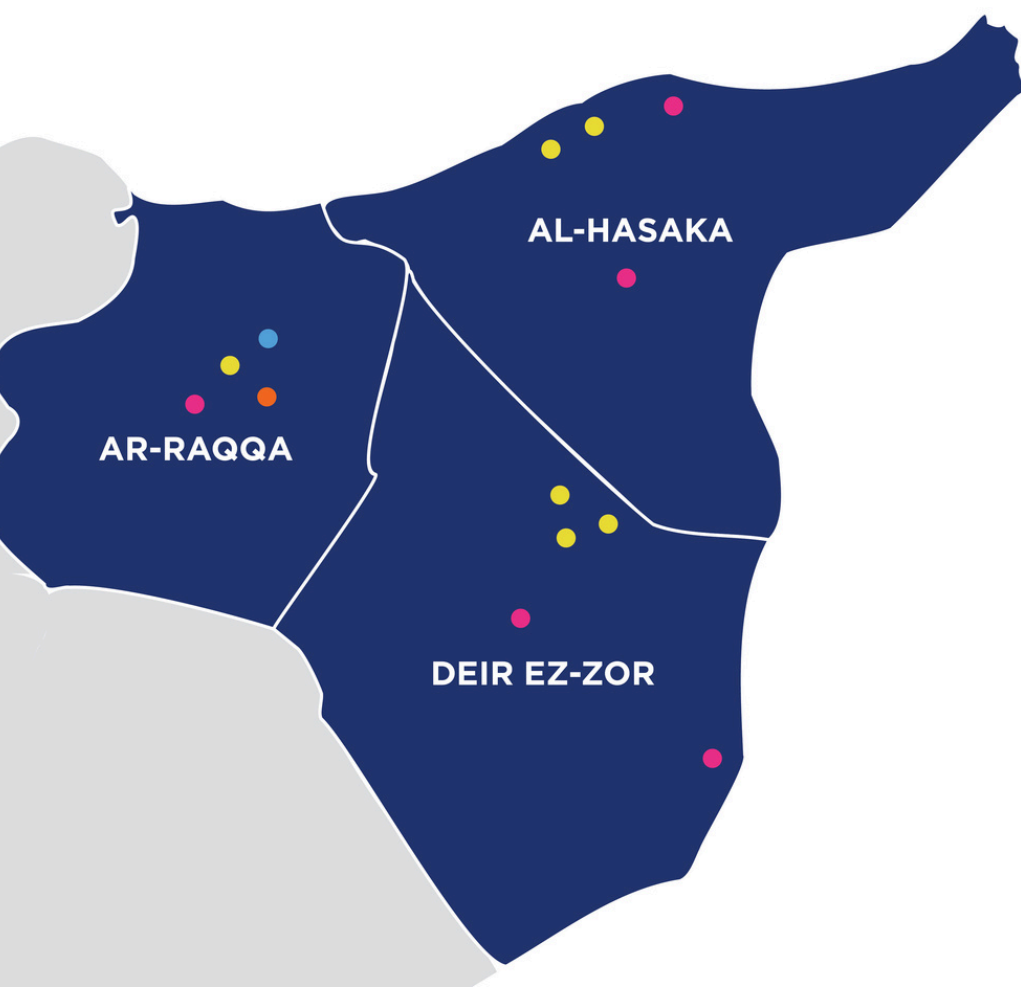

## CONTEXT UPDATES

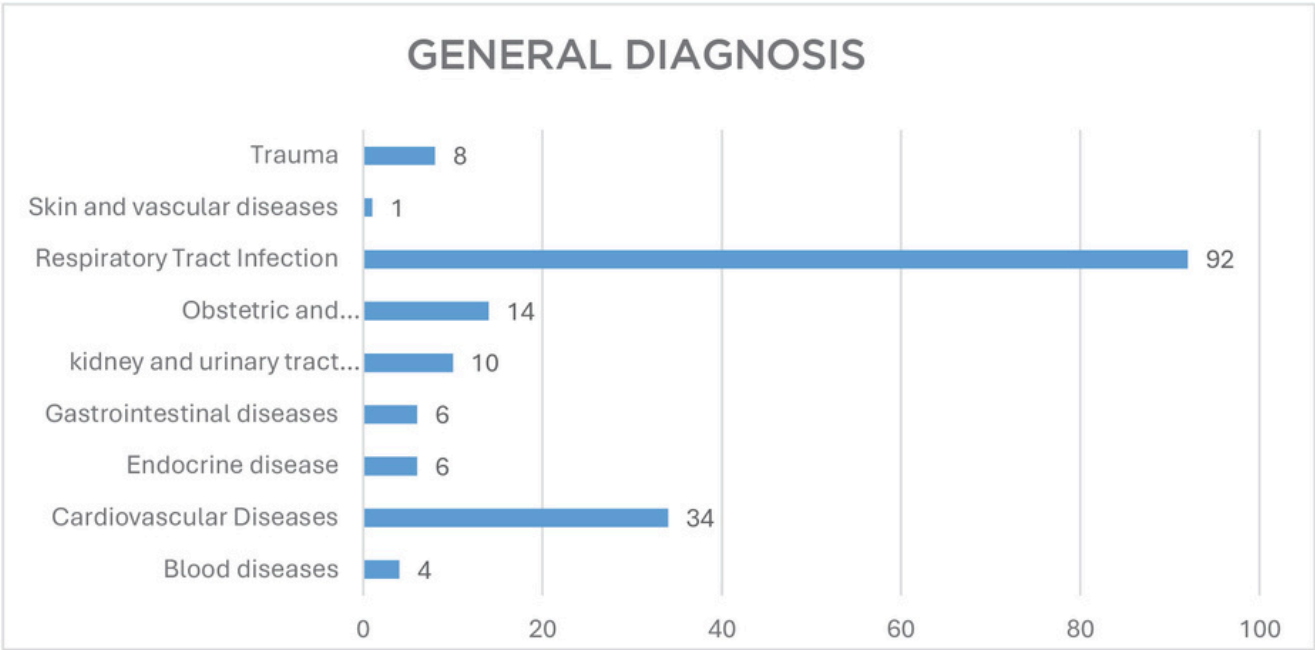
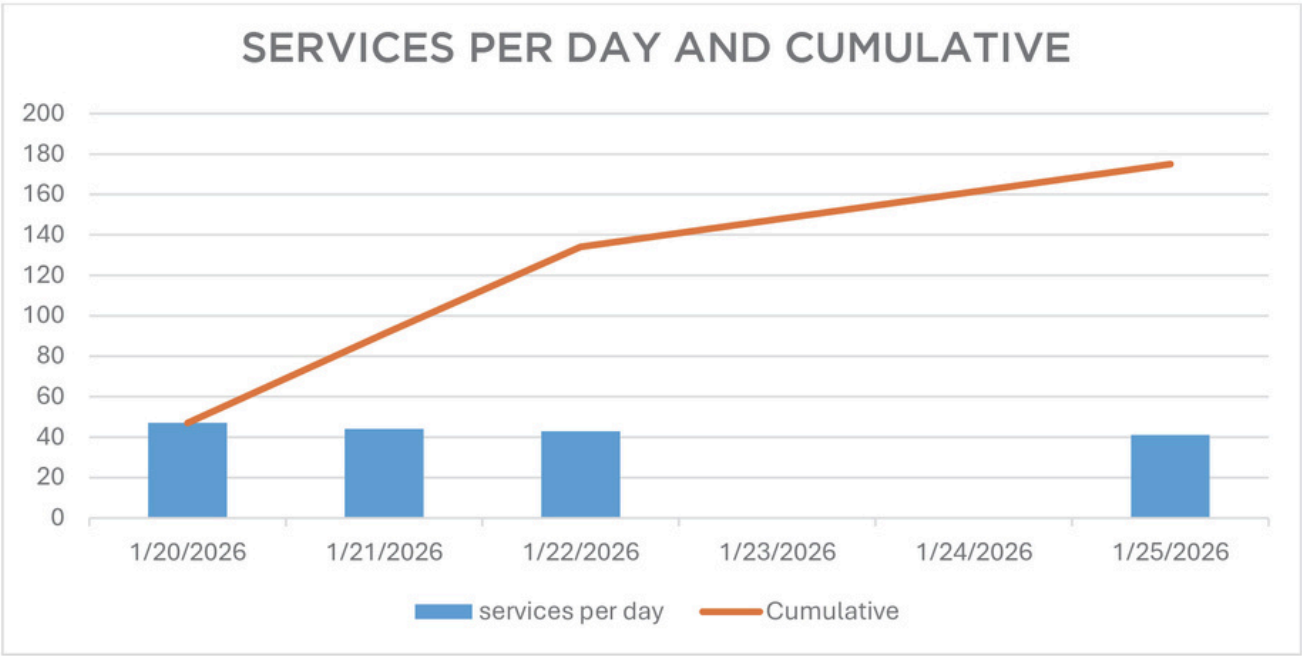
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### Security and Displacement Update – NES (as of 25 January)

- Large-scale displacement occurred from areas of active hostilities in Al-Hasakeh, Ar-Raqqa, and Deir-ez-Zor toward relatively safer locations.
- The number of IDPs in Al-Hasakeh increased sharply to 146,301 individuals, up from 5,725 on 18 January, with most residing in collective centers.
- Priority needs of IDPs in NES include:
  - Multi-purpose cash assistance (94%)
  - Non-food items (94%)
  - Food (63%)
  - Health care services and essential medicines (44%)
- More than 14 health partners are currently responding to the needs of IDPs in camps and collective shelters, providing essential primary health care services and referral support. Active coordination is ongoing with all health partners to ensure timely and adequate responses to emerging needs.

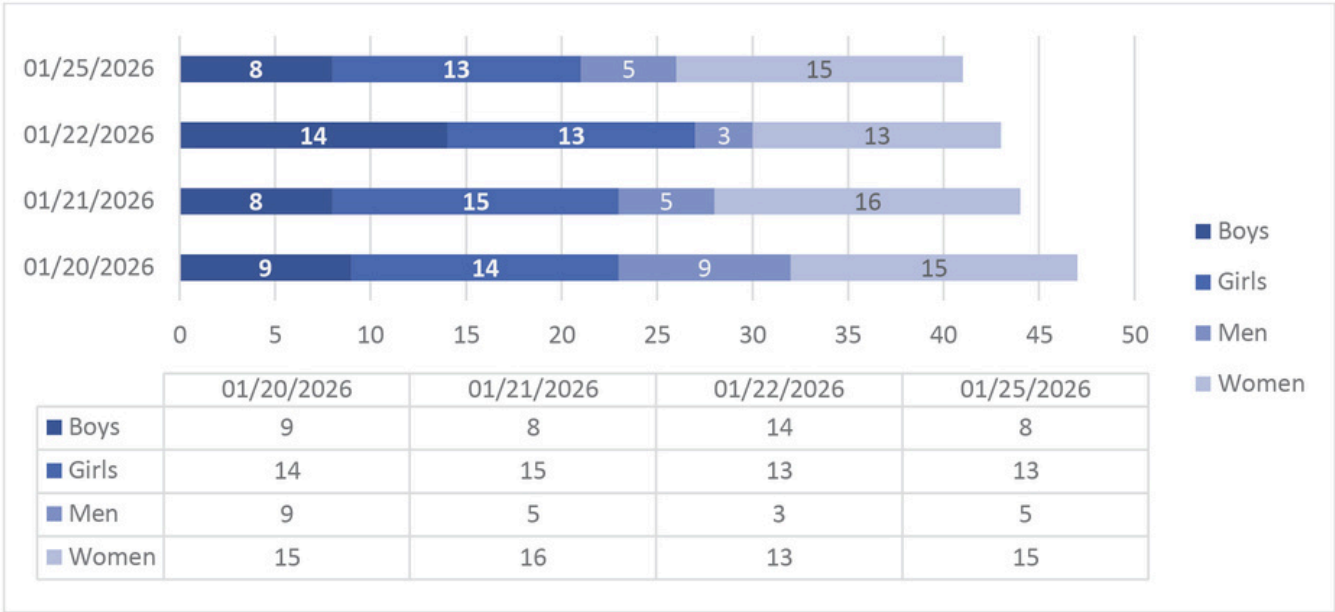


## AR-RAQQA MOBILE MEDICAL UNIT DATA ANALYSIS (01/20/2026 - 01/25/2026)
